Remembering Debbie Canright

Debbie Canright, a former Chair of SWAT and recipient of the 1995 Volunteer of the Year Award, passed away on November 13, 2012. She participated in numerous projects including excavation and stabilization. As a meticulous excavator, her notes were always superior. She was a very active member of our group until about twelve years ago when she became too ill to participate. Debbie was also an avid reader and gave all of her archaeology books and notes to SWAT. These are really appreciated.

SWAT Award

At our December meeting Dr. Jerry Howard, the AzMNH Curator of Anthropology, was presented with a plaque honoring his many years of service to SWAT. Jerry began working with a small group of east valley volunteers at an excavation project on McClintock Road south of Broadway in Tempe



in the late 1970's. That became the nucleus of what later became SWAT. Some of that same group of people, under the leadership of Sam Baar, began working at the Park of the Canals and then the Rowley Site excavation. Jerry has continued to help us with projects all these years including the Pew site excavation, the Sirrine House renovation, and the stage stop and schoolhouse stabilizations at the Verdugo site plus a number of other projects. Through all this time, he has worked to get Mesa Grande preserved. He was instrumental in helping to get the city to buy the property and now finally to have an official Visitors' Center and opening of the Mesa Grande Cultural Park to the public. We have really appreciated Jerry's efforts and help throughout the last 35 years. Thanks, Jerry.

Pueblo Grande Stabilization

Since the last newsletter the Mudslingers have only worked one day. That day was in November when 13 volunteers applied mud to various rooms on top of the platform mound and in the northwest corner of the compound. Also, soil sediments were removed from drop boxes and erosion cuts in the slopes next to the mound were filled.

No workday was scheduled for December. If it had been scheduled it would have had to be cancelled due to the weather. Then in January, we had another problem with "Mother Nature." Work was scheduled for January 12 and it had to be cancelled due to extreme cold temperatures. Remember, the morning was below freezing. Even though we have a dedicated crew, I assumed no one would want to thaw out the water supply in order to mix mud.

Our next workday is scheduled for February 16. In March, we will be working during Pueblo Grande's Ancient Technology Day on March 9th. We will be demonstrating stabilization techniques for the visiting public. 2013 Arizona Archaeology Expo

This year the expo will be held Saturday, March 16 at the very interesting site of Horseshoe Ranch. It's located in a beautiful setting by the river in the Agua Fria National Monument. Not only will you enjoy the scenery on your way to the area, but there will be numerous tours to various sites in the area; including the Badger Springs Petroglyphs, La Plata Pueblo, the Brooklyn Petroglyphs site, and the Teskey Home site. There are petroglyphs right behind the ranch, so that also will be another site to visit. At the ranch will be many booths and activities including lectures in the ranch barn as well as entertainment there. There will be many handson activities, and Hualapai, the tame wild burro, will be attending with his living history re-enactor Tom Taylor. Fry bread as well as other food will be available.

SWAT will have an information table to advertise the Mesa Grande Cultural Park as well as our SWAT group. We will also be in charge of the rabbit hunt and the atlatl (spear) throw activities. Because the expo is rather far away this year, we will be carpooling from the AzMNH early in the morning of March16th. We'll return that evening to the museum. Mesa Grande Cultural Park


What a fantastic Grand Opening! On Saturday January 19th, over 1000 people attended the Opening for the new Visitors' Center! At 8:30 am, there was a Native American Blessing, several short speeches, and then ribbon cutting. This was followed by a free pancake breakfast provided by the Mesa Grande Community Alliance. Visitors were treated to self-

guided tours of the site, reading about the mound at each of the nine kiosk stations. SWAT volunteers were posted near the stations to answer questions — and there were many. At each station four interpretations were shown in a revolving display which included a view from the archaeologist's standpoint, surrounding nature, the history of the Hohokam as applied to the area, and a history lesson about former archaeologists who visited the site in the past. At 10:00 a.m. the Salt River Traditional Dancers entertained everyone.

Many SWAT members helped with the activities including atlatl

(spear) throw, rabbit hunt with throwing sticks, bracelet making with pump drills, hands-on pottery making with Glenn Dotson, and Cano showed and discussed his home made artifact collection. There was also an information table manned by our volunteers. We all had a great time interacting with the visitors and were excited to finally have the site open to the public with interesting interpretations at kiosk stations.

The new Visitors' Center is a very unique building designed by historic architect Ron Peters. Ed Mack and Tim Walters designed and constructed the kiosk stations as well as the desk top inside the center which is made of metal and molded concrete. If you haven't vet had a chance to see the new Cultural Park, be sure and visit. It's now open to the public on Thursdays and Fridays from 10 - 4, on Saturdays 11 - 4, and on Sundays from 12-4. Admission fees are \$5 for adults and \$2 for children. Those who have AzMNH family memberships are free.




